
COTSWOLD GROUP COTTAGE GARDEN SOCIETY TEATIME TALK

OUR FIRST TEATIME TALK WAS JANUARY'S WILDLIFE AND YOUR GARDEN:



At our January meeting, Jo Worthy-Jones of Haven4Wildlife spoke to us enthusiastically from her extensive experience, both of wildlife and gardening, having spent 14 years working for Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust. She described gardens as nature reserves, especially in this time of climate change and loss of habitats. She reminded us of the days when a car journey meant windscreens covered in dead insects and how rare that was now in what she called 'the insect apocalypse'.

To make your garden wildlife friendly she outlined some key tips:

Have water in your garden – for drinking, bathing and living in.. If a pond is out, any container with an edge on which creatures can perch and from which they can get in and out will do just fine. Marbles or stones in a shallow dish allow for this. One of gardeners' friends, hoverflies spend part of their lifecycle in stagnant water as rattailed maggots, so a pot with leaves and stagnant water in can be an excellent nursery.

Support insect life – plant for a long flowering season and include simple flowers which more insects can access and night-scented flowers for moths.

Feed - Plants provide a natural food at flower and seed stages, so don't deadhead too ferociously and include native species. Those caterpillars who don't make it to adulthood have often been excellent food for birds – a pair of nesting blue tits can take 3000 caterpillars in 2 weeks!

Provide homes and shelter– eg. simple log or leaf piles, insect "hotels", home made or bought. Remember that most animals and birds prefer to follow a hedge or tree line, rather than cross open spaces where they are more vulnerable.

Don't use chemicals!

Jo is very happy to visit individual gardens to assess their wildlife friendliness and can also provide gift vouchers for that service. She also runs nature journaling sessions (Flier attached)

❖ Downton House, Gloucester Street, Painswick GL6 6QN

6th and 7th February 10.30 – 3pm £5 adults; children free. Refreshments available.

The owner is co-author of 'The Galanthophiles: 160 Years of Snowdrop Devotees' The walled ½ acre garden in the centre of Painswick provides the perfect setting for her collection of Galanthus cultivars. In addition, naturalised drifts of Galanthus nivalis and Galanthus atkinsii flourish amongst winter-flowering shrubs, cyclamen, Iris reticulata and Polystichum ferns.

Trench Hill, Sheepscombe GL6 6TZ

Sundays 12th and 19th February 11 – 4 £5 adults; children free. Refreshments available.

Approx 3 acres set in a small woodland with panoramic views. Variety of herbaceous and mixed borders, rose garden, extensive vegetable plots, wildflower areas, plantings of spring bulbs with thousands of snowdrops and hellebores, woodland walk, two small ponds, waterfall and larger conservation pond. Interesting wooden sculptures, many within the garden. Cultivated using organic principles.

❖ Home Farm, Newent Lane, Huntley GL19 3HQ

12th Feb 11- 4 £4 adults; children free. Refreshments available at local garden centre.

Set in an elevated position with exceptional views. 1 mile walk through woods and fields to show carpets of spring flowers. Enclosed garden with fern border, sundial and heather bed. White and mixed shrub borders. Stout footwear advisable in winter.
