NGS GARDENS IN JUNE

In June, members also report enjoying:

Campden House, outside Chipping Campden, has 5 acres of garden around a 17th century house and tithe barn, all within parkland. There are mixed border, lakes and ponds in a hidden valley, along with woodland walks, croquet lawn, walled garden and a vegetable garden – all managed by the same on-site gardener for 32 years!



Rockcliffe

Some members also visited Rockcliffe and Tower Close.

Rockcliffe in Upper Slaughter has eight immaculate acres of garden with many different areas, including herbaceous border, topiary, croquet lawn, terraces, pool and an impressive vegetable garden. Fruit cage envy!

Tower Close, Snowshill, is the impressive achievement of 2 Canadian owners who have transformed a steep, grassy hillside in a stunning location into a delightful, quirky garden with both formal and wilder areas, a big pond and stream, and viewpoints throughout.

Awkward Hill Cottage

After the flurry of June openings, July is a quieter month for National Garden Scheme openings. High summer is much more challenging for gardeners than the abundant joys of May and June, but there are some hidden gems to be enjoyed. We particularly recommend:

A group opening at Arlington and Bibury, GL7 5ND (Combined admission, £12; child, free). New to the scheme this year are Long Cottage, a courtyard garden with ingenious ideas for making the most of a small space, and Pudding Hill Barn, a large country garden, sloping down to the River Coln, with both formal and informal planting. Longstanding opener is Awkward Hill Cottage, a wildlife-friendly terraced

country garden above Bibury, with a pond, gravel garden, mixed borders and shade planting.

The gardens will be open on Wednesday 2 July (3-7.30pm) and Sunday 6 July (10am-2.30pm). Pre-booking essential, on www.ngs.org.uk. Awkward Hill Cottage is also open by arrangement for groups of 10 to 30 until 20 July.

Also new to the National Garden Scheme this year, **is HMP Leyhill, near Wotton-under-Edge, GL12 8BT, opening on Saturday 26 July (10am-4pm; £8)**. This is a very heartening garden, with many different areas, including perennial borders, an alpine rockery and a commercial horticulture centre. The focus is on providing an environment to promote physical and mental well-being for prisoners nearing release. **Pre-booking on www.ngs.org.uk** is essential for the guided tours.

Opening on Saturday 19 July, **The Stables**, Hyde Lane, Cheltenham, GL51 9QN (1-5pm; Adult, £6; chid, free) is a remarkable new garden of just over half an acre.



Against the backdrop of Cleeve Hill, it has been created from a bare site over the past five years, very much under the influence of the Dutch designer Piet Oudolf. The garden wowed the crowds when it opened for the first time last year with its bold planting of swathes of colourful perennials intermingled with great bands of grasses. An acre of wildflower meadow is separated from the garden by a mature native hedge. It's very different from anything else in the Gloucestershire portfolio and well worth a visit.

WINCHCOMBE GREEN TRAIL

Previously an Open Gardens walk, this event now includes other green spaces in Winchcombe to highlight the importance of nature in all its diversity. Win Green Town is organising the Winchcombe Green Trail on **Sunday 6th July 1pm to 5pm** in collaboration with Isbourne Arts. Start the trail at Isbourne Arts where doors open at 12.30. Stalls, refreshments and children's treasure hunt. £5 per person; children free. Join us there!

VILLAGE OPEN GARDENS

There are various village open garden events throughout the summer. **Prestbury opened 16 gardens over 2 days** in June, ranging from modern stylish designs to traditional cottage gardens and others displaying the owner's pottery or a local willow-weaver's craft.



On the 21st and 22nd June, Blockley opened 9 of its gardens under the NGS, ranging from small cottage gardens to mill conversions and new builds made to suit the existing grounds. A warm welcome everywhere from knowledgeable owners – and great plants for sale in the village hall - if you could get past the cakes first!



In July, you can visit 9 Open Gardens in Broad Campden, near Chipping Campden, Gloucestershire on Saturday 5th from 11.00am to 4.00pm. £7 adults; children free. Cash payment preferred. Refreshments in the village hall.
