12^{TH} FEBRUARY 2026 AURICULAS AND PRIMULAS INGRID AND JOHN MILLINGTON

Ingrid and John run Hillview Hardy Plants near Bridgnorth, their specialisms including auriculas and primulas. In 2022 they won their first RHS Gold Medal at Malvern Spring Fair and in 2023 they were the Master Growers at the show. Their talk will look at just a few of the 100's of primulas available, followed by a foray into the lovely world of auriculas.



THURSDAY 19TH MARCH THE STORY OF GOTHERINGTON NURSERIES


Mark will talk to us about his local family business, Gotherington Nurseries, and about his experience of growing and providing plants for both local customers and many shows including Hampton Court.

An online review of Gloucestershire nurseries described Gotherington as "one of those hidden gems that locals love to keep to themselves ...where the focus is firmly on healthy plants and friendly faces." The Nurseries stock a wide range of plants and horticultural products and online you will also find a store of very useful fact sheets to help you.

NOVEMBER MEETING:

Rosanne, the Groups' Co-ordinator of our national body, the Cottage Garden Society, talked to us about Bodnant Gardens, the splendid National Trust property developed over 150 years in the foothills of Snowdon. Living in North Wales, Rosanne has been a volunteer at the garden for a number of years, but still hasn't tired of the place and is sure there are paths she has not yet taken. Given that are over 8 miles of paths threading through the 80 acres of gardens, that is understandable!

Established by Victorian entrepreneur Henry Pochin in 1874, the gardens were developed by 5 generations of his family, with descendants still managing the wider estate and living in the grand house he built.



The house and its new conservatory are not open to the public, unlike the Grade 1 listed gardens, in the care of the National Trust from 1949. They are home to historic and national plant collections and heritage trees. There is something to see in every season from the daffodils, rhododendrons, azaleas, magnolias and camellias in spring; quickly followed by the glorious laburnum arch (the longest known); then the roses and herbaceous borders of summer; the glowing autumn foliage; and the Winter Garden. The garden's size enables it to have both formal areas of terraces and wilder areas of meadows, waterfalls and woodland.

While there is something for everyone all year round, Rosanne said that if you were only likely to visit once, it might be best to go in late April or early May. The whole area of the Conwy valley is lovely and makes a good holiday destination.

Roseanne said that Bodnant's Pin Mill was transported from Gloucestershire. Intrigued, I discovered that it was originally a garden house built about 1730 at Frogmarsh, Woodchester, later used by a pin mill and then as a tannery hide store. The 2nd Baron Aberconway apparently noticed it when driving locally and bought the derelict building to be moved to Bodnant in 1938/9 and restored. The fine Grade 2* listed Georgian building now stands at the head of a canal, a thing of beauty once more.
