#### **15<sup>TH</sup> JANUARY 2026 THE HONEY BEE AND BEE KEEPING BRIAN MILLER-HALL**

Brian has been keeping bees for 16 years and currently manages 12 hives. From that extensive experience, he will give us insight into the fascinating life of honey bees and the role of the beekeeper.

#### **12<sup>TH</sup> FEBRUARY 2026 AURICULAS AND PRIMULAS INGRID AND JOHN MILLINGTON**

Ingrid and John run Hillview Hardy Plants near Bridgnorth, their specialisms including auriculas and primulas. In 2022 they won their first RHS Gold Medal at Malvern Spring Fair and in 2023 they were the Master Growers at the show. Their talk will look at just a few of the 100's of primulas available, followed by a foray into the lovely world of auriculas.

## THURSDAY 19TH MARCH THE STORY OF GOTHERINGTON NURSERIES

Mark will talk to us about his local family business, Gotherington Nurseries, and about his experience of growing and providing plants for both local customers and many shows including Hampton Court.

After all the Christmas feasting and celebrations, you’re probably longing to get out into the countryside and start visiting gardens again. By mid-January, you should be able to pick up the National Garden Scheme Gloucestershire 2026 booklet from garden centres and tourist information centres across the county. **Home Farm**, Newent Lane, Huntley, GL19 3HQ (Adult, £4.50, child, free) will be opening on Sunday 25th January and Sunday 8th February (11am-4pm). After worked with the National Garden Scheme for over 35 years, the owner, Torill Freeman, is hanging up her hat in 2026. So this will be your last chance to see the wonderful carpets of snowdrops (below) spreading out along the course of a winding mile-long walk through beech woods.

Another glorious snowdrop garden is **Cotswold Farm**, Duntisbourne Abbots, Cirencester, GL7 7JS, open on Saturday 14th and Sunday 15th February (11am-3pm; adult, £7.50, child, free).

You will also be able to see a wonderful display of snowdrops running through the five-acre valley and woodland gardens at **Campden House**, Dyer's Lane, Chipping Campden, GL55 6UP, open on Sunday 8 February (10am-3pm; adult, £10, child, £5).

Other snowdrop openings include **Algars Manor**, Station Road, Iron Acton, BS37 9TB opens with the adjacent **Algars Mill** on Sunday 22 February (1-4pm; combined admission, adult, £7, child, free). These two woodland, riverside gardens will be full of snowdrops, as well as emerging daffodils, magnolias and camellias.

**Looking ahead to spring and summer, new gardens joining the scheme for the first time in 2026 include:**

**Besom Cottage**, Lower Common, Aylburton, Lydney, GL15 6DU

Open on Saturday 16th and Sunday 17th May from 1-5pm. Adult, £5; child, free.



This tiered garden was created from a former pub car park by its landscape architect owner and features ornamental and native planting, a stumpery and a woodland fern garden.

**Frog Lane Flower Farm**, North Nibley, Dursley, GL11 6DJ (Adult, £6; child, free) will be opening on Sunday 16th August from 11am to 4pm. You will have the chance to see this organic flower farm in operation before having a homemade tea at adjacent Netherfields, with spectacular views across the River Severn to the Black Mountains.

**DID YOU KNOW?**

- **The Garden Museum** has recently acquired the Nesfield Archive, a rich 19<sup>th</sup> century archive of the artist/gardener William Andrews Nesfield, which will extend its already substantial archive of garden design. The current exhibition at the Garden Museum, *Rory McEwen: Nature's Song*, runs until 25th January. The Scottish artist and musician is seen as someone who "blurred the boundaries between botanical illustration and modern art." *Nelly Roberts: Orchid Painter* runs until the end of the month. Nelly was the RHS's first and longest serving orchid artist with a remarkable output of

beautiful, meticulously accurate flower portraits using innovative techniques to capture her subjects.

Café, garden, museum, exhibitions, and archive, the Garden Museum is usually open daily 10am – 5pm including bank holidays with the exception of Christmas Day and Boxing Day, but do check the site for the latest opening hours.
